Public Health Management Corporation	\$490,039	To study whether integrating trained “Peer Recovery Specialists” into Philadelphia’s adult drug treatment court can help reduce recidivism and drug relapse.
University of Washington	\$495,373	To study a program that pairs post-release offenders in Washington State with medical professionals who advise them about medication assisted treatment in order to determine whether the intervention can help to reduce recidivism, relapse, and hospitalizations.
Trustees of the University of Pennsylvania	\$329,060	To fund a randomized controlled trial of an informational tool for public defenders that is designed to help reduce sentencing disparities.
Family Service Agency of Santa Barbara	\$498,524	To study the adult holistic defense case management model and its use in Santa Barbara, California.
Treatment Research Institute	\$499,617	To develop and study a pre-booking police protocol that diverts substance-involved offenders in Philadelphia to treatment in lieu of arrest.
The University of Chicago	\$199,367	To develop and study a pre-booking police protocol that diverts narcotics-involved offenders in Chicago to treatment in lieu of arrest.
Duke University	\$339,516	To study whether the use of Vivitrol, a medication assisted treatment for opioid use disorder, can help reduce recidivism among drug court participants in Wake County, North Carolina.

University of Miami	\$429,389	To develop and study a multi-dimensional family therapy program for young adults in the Miami-Dade criminal drug court.

Washington University	\$361,572	To study the Deferred Prosecution Programs of the prosecutor offices in Cook County, Illinois; Milwaukee County, Wisconsin; and the City of St. Louis, Missouri.
